Greetings,

On behalf of the Association of Population Centers (APC), I am proud to share with you the 2025 edition of the APC Resource Guide, a compendium of individual profiles of the nation's premier independent population research organizations. In these pages, you will find a comprehensive overview of the current state of population science including research subject matter, interdisciplinary and cross-institutional collaborations, and applications to real-world decision-making and policy development.

Founded in 1991, the APC is an independent group of university-based centers and private sector research organizations whose mission is to

- foster collaborative demographic research and data sharing;
- translate basic population research for public policy decision-makers;
- and provide educational and training opportunities in population studies.

Almost 50 distinct entities comprise the APC, including broad-based population centers as well as several centers focused specifically on aging populations. All our member centers are interdisciplinary, drawing faculty and research staff from diverse fields such as demography, public health, sociology, economics, geography, epidemiology, medicine, anthropology, biostatistics, public policy, and statistics. Scholars at APC centers conduct research on the individual, societal, and environmental implications of population change. Their diverse interests include topics such as child and adolescent health, health disparities, childcare, education, labor market conditions, immigration and migration, racial and ethnic inequalities, family formation and dissolution, fertility, morbidity and mortality, aging and retirement, disruptive events [natural disasters and public health emergencies], housing and homelessness, rural and urban populations, and population forecasting. This research, in turn, serves to inform planning, policy formulation, and decision-making at the local, regional, national, and international levels.

APC centers rely on a multitude of public and private funding sources to support population scientists' research. The National Institute on Aging and the Eunice Kennedy Shriver National Institute of Child Health and Human Development at the National Institutes of Health provide most of the competitive federal funding for demographic research. The National Science Foundation and the Agency for International Development are two other important sources of federal support. Population researchers also rely on accessible data produced by the Census Bureau, the National Center for Health Statistics, the National Center for Education Statistics, and the Bureau of Labor Statistics, as well as large representative panel surveys, to conduct their research.



Research to Policy

- In 2024, CEDA advised the Congressional Budget Office (CBO), in response to a request, regarding the fiscal impacts of the "surge" of undocumented immigrants in the 2022–2024 period. Specifically, CEDA staff advised the CBO on how to update research on the fiscal impacts of immigration.
- The National Transfer Accounts (NTA) are being used both domestically and internationally to inform governments and influence policy. Some examples include:
- o Thirteen governments responded to a 2024 UNFPA survey indicating that they are using NTA to analyze investment in health and education of children, potential labor productivity, employability and employment policies, training and capacity building or skills-based education, and issues related to population aging and the elderly, especially social care and welfare policies.

Research to Policy (cont'd)

- o In line with the African Union emphasis on the demographic dividend, the NTA regional leader in Africa, Latif Dramani, with support from the United Nations, set up national demographic observatories in numerous countries in Africa, starting in Addis Adaba. The purpose is to identify policies, strengthen capacity, and assess progress. As of 2024 these countries have introduced the demographic dividend into their national development policy document at the macro level as well as the sectoral level. Policy makers have also initiated national debates on taking into account population dynamics in development programs.
- o Ronald Lee wrote a substantial 2024 report at the request of the United Nations Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific (ESCAP) on how NTA leads to clear policy recommendations in Asia and the Pacific.
- o Singapore has previously eschewed public pensions and instead relied on mandatory savings. Research from CEDA's National Transfer Accounts project lead Christopher Gee in Singapore revealed that Singapore elders rely on family transfers from their own younger family members to fund almost half of their consumption, which is more than other high-income countries, due to insufficient savings. This has substantial implications for other countries considering privatizing Social Security-2024 saw the utility of this work being extended to inform policymakers on a range of matters, from fiscal sustainability to the costs of raising a child. The Strategy Group in the Prime Minister's Office is supporting the work to update the estimates of Singapore's NTA using the most recent data.
- o Colombia's Office of Statistics (DANE) has now included CEDA's NTA data as part of its official statistics, releasing it in October 2024. This includes NTA data by sex, which is relevant to studying gender differences in how aging affects the labor market, pensions, and health transfers. DANE Director Piedad Urdinolla held a press conference on the data, inviting other national agencies, and also presented the NTA data at the UN World Data Forum this year. Among other policy applications, the data were used to inform negotiations over Colombia's national minimum wage.

Research to Policy

- In August 2024, the California Policy Lab (CPL)—in partnership with the California Community College (CCC) Chancellor's Office, the University of California Office of the President (UCOP), the California Department of Social Services (CDSS), and the California Student Aid Commission (CSAC)—Jesse Rothstein, and colleagues released a report estimating that among California community college students, 20% of students were eligible, and among UC undergraduates, 33% were eligible for CalFresh, California's version of the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), also commonly known as Food Stamps. In Summer 2024 the California Policy Lab presented these findings during a webinar where California State Senator Nancy Skinner provided an introduction and our partners also shared their perspectives on the research.
- Jenna Nobles served on the Eunice Kennedy Shriver National Institute of Child Health and Human Development's Stillbirth Working Group of Council. On March 15, 2023, the working group released its final report to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Working to Address the Tragedy of Stillbirth, and in July 2024, released a follow-up implementation recommendations report.
- Emmanuel Saez discussed a paper on September 26 at the Brookings Papers on Economic Activity conference that argued that "social efficiency" is the most appropriate translation of the legal concept of full employment. Using efficiency as the criterion, the paper—"u* = √uv: The Full-Employment Rate of Unemployment in the United States"—argues that the best measure of full employment is the midpoint (in log scale) between the unemployment rate (jobless workers as a percentage of the labor force) to the vacancy rate (job openings as a percentage of the labor force).




- · For the past decade, researchers affiliated with our flagship study, Health and Aging in Africa: Longitudinal Studies in South Africa (HAALSA), have been examining the demographic and epidemiologic transition taking place in this understudied region. Its population has experienced a boost in life expectancy (partly due to the successful scale up of antiretroviral therapy) and, thus, an uptick in the noncommunicable diseases that typically accompany a longer life (e.g., cardiovascular disease, diabetes). In 2023, the NIH grant was renewed with an expanded focus on cognitive aging and dementia, and several studies on the impact of cash transfers and child support grants have generated findings that could influence public policies targeting this aging population. Findings from a study published in March 2024 suggest that mothers (of up to four children) who were eligible to receive a child support grant for longer stretches of time had a better cognitive function score, and a study published in September 2024 found "a modestly sized household cash transfer delivered over a short period in mid- to later-life led to a meaningful slowing of memory decline and reduction in dementia probability seven years later." These findings add weight to the viability of social safety net programs such as these to help protect cognitive health in an economically vulnerable population.
- Research co-led by faculty member Daniel Schneider indicates that boosting the minimum wage for California fast food workers to \$20/hour (a law that took effect in April 2024 and was the largest single minimum wage increase ever implemented by a state) did not appear to negatively impact staffing, scheduling practices, or access to benefits. After the \$4.00/hour increase went into effect, the Shift Project researchers collected survey data from 3,420 fast food workers and compared it to data collected from California retail workers and fast food workers in other western states. Researchers did not find evidence that the increase in California fast food workers' wages led to an increase in negative work conditions, such as understaffing or a reduction in hours or fringe benefits. This research provides policy makers with findings that could help buffer against concerns about raising the minimum wage, a measure that was on the ballot in California in the 2024 election.
- A Harvard Center for Population and Development Studies working paper ("Politicians, Power, and the People's Health: U.S. Elections and State Health Outcomes, 2012–2024," Volume 24, No. 1) by faculty member Nancy Krieger et al. published two months before the 2024 election caught the attention of writers for The Nation and The Guardian who were reporting on how our votes might affect our health. Although the study is descriptive ("it doesn't establish a cause-and-effect relationship between a state's politics and health

outcomes"), it does reinforce other emerging literature on the "political determinants of health." The researchers examined the association between four state-level metrics (e.g., political party control and policies enacted) and eight health-related outcomes (e.g., premature mortality and food insecurity) at the state level and found that "higher state-level political conservatism was associated with worse health outcomes."

Reasearch to Policy

- The work of PSC faculty Luke Shaefer, Natasha Pilkauskas, and Katherine Michelmore on the effects of the 2021 Child Tax Credit, whose development was informed by Shaefer's work, has been central in discussions of that policy and was cited in the Economic Report of the President in 2024. Shaefer's cash allowance program in Flint, Michigan, Rx Kids, was the basis of Vice President Harris's proposal for a \$6,000 newborn credit that was part of her presidential campaign platform. Michelmore is currently serving on the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine Committee on the Federal Policy Impacts of Poverty that is assessing the impacts of the CTC and Earned Income Tax Credit.
- The FTC's Non-Compete Clause Rule (the "final rule"), published in the Federal Register on May 7, 2024, and effective September 4, 2024, extensively cites the research work of affiliate JJ Prescott on non-compete agreements.
- The Criminal Justice Administrative Records System (CJARS) launched the Justice
 Outcomes Explorer, or JOE, on May 1, 2024, making millions of statistics available in an
 accessible, easy-to-navigate format at joe.cjars.org. In 2024, the site had 4,509 unique
 visitors and 389 downloads of bulk data that provide unprecedented insights into how the
 criminal legal system reshapes the lives of Americans.
- Julie Maslowsky served as a scientific consultant for HRA Pharma during the FDA review and approval of OPill, the United States' first over-the-counter oral contraceptive pill that became available in March 2024. Maslowsky specifically consulted on minor adolescents' access to OPill, and the FDA ultimately chose to authorize the product for use in people of all ages.
- Julie Maslowsky was lead author of the report, "Adolescence Post-Dobbs: A Policy-Driven Research Agenda for Minor Adolescents and Abortion," published in May 2024, addressing that adolescents are vastly underrepresented in research on abortion in the United States, and presenting an actionable research agenda on abortion policy and its impacts on minors. Maslowsky and her team are currently creating an open-access data dashboard of U.S. state policies on abortion, contraception, and sex education from 1973—2028 that will facilitate longitudinal research on the health, economic, and social impacts of changing sexual and reproductive health policies.
- Poverty Solutions and PSC affiliate Kristen Seefeldt are completing the two-year Guaranteed Income to Grow Ann Arbor pilot project, providing monthly payments to entrepreneurs with low incomes in Ann Arbor. The project published its baseline report in October 2024. Findings (which will be shared in the coming two years as the last payments will go out in December 2025) will reveal the impact of the payments on housing stability, health, and other measures of well-being as well as whether the payments help participants grow their businesses or entrepreneurial work.

- Policymakers Plan for a Rapidly Aging Population: LCC member Joe Gaugler was appointed to the Minnesota Legislature's "Task Force on Aging" to help with the formation of policies to address the aging population. The work of the task force (started in 2023) is ongoing, and its suggestions are expected to be taken up in the 2025 legislative session. Sessions are held in hybrid format in the Minnesota Senate Building and the Minnesota State Capitol building. Preliminary recommendations to come out of the task force include: 1) the proposed creation of a new state department dedicated to aging-related policies and services, ensuring cabinet-level representation and comprehensive planning for older adults; 2) increased emphasis on collaboration with Area Agencies on Aging and local communities to provide current and relevant information and support to older adults, facilitating their ability to age within their communities; and 3) inclusive policy development with an emphasis on collaboration with Area Agencies on Aging and local communities to provide current and relevant information and support to older adults, facilitating their ability to age within their communities.
- Research Network Connects Scholars and Policymakers Across the Country: The Life Course Center is currently partnering with IPUMS to create the Network for Data-Intensive Research on Aging (NDIRA). All administration, communication, and support for this active and engaged network happens at the LCC. The group (established in 2021) has 1,170 members from across the country who are linked with research resources, funding opportunities, collaboration networks, and research. Each year LCC hosts a well-attended research conference at the University of Minnesota in late July or early August where findings are shared and specialists from across the globe meet.

Research to Policy

- Myron Orfield, the Earl R. Larson Professor of Civil Rights and Civil Liberties Law, is pursuing several projects closely tied to Racial Segregation, Housing, Transportation, and Tax Policy. His research plays a central role in two racial desegregation court cases in Minnesota, including the Cruz–Guzman school desegregation court case (ongoing), and a Low Income Housing Tax Credit housing desegregation court case (ongoing), as well as another segregation court case in New Jersey. His work was also cited in a federal fair housing case in New York (decision in 2024). The federal administration is using Professor Orfield's research in the areas of transportation and housing planning. He has been called on to testify this past year before local and federal commissions on housing policy, tax policy, and land use policy, including the Minnesota Advisory Committee of the U.S. Civil Rights Commission (July 2024) and the New Jersey Joint Committee on Public Schools (2024).
- The research of Dr. Kumi Smith, Associate Professor of Epidemiology, examines the health impacts of evictions on homeless encampments in Minneapolis, which has resulted in several direct conversations with officials at the Minnesota State Department of Transportation and the Minneapolis City Council throughout 2023 and 2024. Dr. Smith has also been asked to advise community experts and provide input on the drafting of city ordinances on the topic; this research is ongoing and will be published and made available to policy makers, media, and community members in 2025.
- Dr. Katy Backes Kozhimannil, Distinguished McKnight University Professor of Health Policy and Management, regularly consults with federal legislators on efforts to improve equitable access to obstetric services in rural areas. Recent 2024 contacts include those with the U.S. Senate Finance Committee and the offices of Senators Tina Smith (MN), Maggie Hassan (NH), Ron Wyden (OR), and Ben Cardin (MD), and Representatives Lauren Underwood (IL) and Matt Cartwright (PA). These conversations and her research informed two recent pieces of federal legislation: the Keeping Obstetrics Local Act (introduced September 25, 2024) and the Rural Obstetric Readiness Act (introduced April 9, 2024). She also met with Senator Jerry Moran (KS) and Senator Tina Smith (MN) on the Rural Emergency Hospital Improvement Act (introduced May 14, 2024).

Research to Policy

- As part of the PAA Committee on Population Statistics, Shannon Monnat met with federal statistical agencies—including the U.S. Census Bureau, Bureau of Labor Statistics, National Center for Health Statistics, Department of Homeland Security Statistics, Bureau of Justice Statistics, Office of the Chief Statistician of the United States, and the National Secure Data Service—in April and December 2024 to provide input into federal data collection activities. Research to Policy

- Avshalom Caspi found that one out of every 8 encounters that primary-care physicians have with patients is for a mental health concern (published in *Nature Mental Health* in September 2024). Only musculoskeletal conditions account for a greater share of primary-care physicians' attention. These findings have implications for medical training, treatment, and public understanding of mental health. Emerging from a comprehensive analysis of over 350 million nationwide primary-care records in Norway, the results point to the magnitude of mental health care that primary-care practices are being asked to deliver for patients across the lifespan, from pediatric to geriatric patients. The findings support calls for integrating mental health services into primary-care settings.
- Christina Gibson-Davis found that the fertility desires of U.S. high school seniors are related to their political identity (published in May 2024 in the *Journal of Marriage and Family*). For the past several decades, Republican young adults want more children than do Democratic young adults; since the mid-2000s, the gaps in the fertility desires of Republicans and Democrats have widened, with Republican young adults more likely to say they want to have any children and, conditional on wanting children, want larger families. Political identity has become increasingly salient for fertility desires, suggesting that identity might shape fertility intentions and future fertility behavior in the United States.

Research to Policy

- A member of the Scientific Advisory Committee (CSAC) for the U.S. Census Bureau since 2021, Barbara Entwisle was named as chair of the committee earlier this year. The committee provides advice on the design, operation, and implementation of Census Bureau programs. Members advise the Census Bureau director on the uses of scientific developments in statistical data collection, survey methodology, geospatial and statistical analysis, econometrics, cognitive psychology, business operations, and computer science as they pertain to the full range of Census Bureau programs and activities, including census tests, policies, and operations. At the September 2024 meeting, the committee provided feedback and guidance about the implications of changes in racial/ethnic data collection in Census products and how to communicate these changes to various constituencies who use Census data for research, programs, and policies.
- A U.S. Senate bill to address childhood diabetes was introduced in April 2024 based on research from CPC's Global Food Research Program as well as Lindsey Smith Taillie's testimony in the U.S. Senate in December 2023. The Childhood Diabetes Reduction Act would establish a first-of-its-kind federal ban on junk food advertising targeted to children in the United States, require the Food and Drug Administration to implement strong health and nutrient warning labeling, direct the National Institutes of Health to investigate the dangers posed by ultra-processed foods, and develop a national education campaign for children and caregivers through the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

• Susan L. Brown, Kei Nomaguchi, and Krista K. Westrick-Payne are part of SOAR (State of Ohio Adversity and Resilience), a large, state-funded initiative that began in 2024 and is led by The Ohio State University's Wexner Medical Center. The BGSU team is working with colleagues from 10 other Ohio universities to examine the mental health of Ohioans, both through a large social survey of 15,000 Ohioans and a companion brain health study of roughly 3,600 members from 1,200 families. These studies will inform and guide new strategies for prevention, recovery and resilience. The invaluable information gathered through SOAR will be used to improve mental health care in Ohio, nationwide, and across the globe.

Research to Policy

- A white paper written by researchers at the Ohio Policy Evaluation Network, including IPR affiliates Alison Norris and Mikaela Smith, was cited as part of ongoing litigation to block Ohio's policy requiring a 48-hour waiting period before obtaining an abortion. A judge in the Franklin County Court of Common Pleas (Columbus, Ohio) granted a temporary injunction on August 23, 2024, and the waiting period is not currently in effect in Ohio while the litigation unfolds. OPEN's white paper, which was cited in the Plaintiffs' Reply in Support of Motion for Preliminary Injunction, provided evidence of how the 48-hour waiting period burdens abortion patients and providers in Ohio.
- Joyce Lee, a social work scholar focusing on the impact of father involvement on families, spoke on parental substance abuse and child maltreatment at the Ohio Sobriety, Treatment, and Reducing Trauma (START) Summit held by Summit County Children's Services on November 12, 2024, at their facility in Akron, Ohio. Ohio START is an evidence-based program that brings together child welfare services with substance use disorder treatment services to provide wraparound care for families affected by the opioid epidemic. Lee presented evaluation data showing that Ohio START improves family functioning, and she discussed implications for child welfare programming and practice with program leadership and staff.
- Smitha Rao presented findings from her research on disaster risk reduction among older adults in Central Ohio to a meeting of the Advisory Council of the Central Ohio Area Agency on Aging (COAAA), held May 2, 2024, in Columbus, Ohio. Based on Rao's research, COAAA has expanded distribution of disaster preparedness kits and information, especially among residents of low-income housing in the region. Rao's team and COAAA also presented this study to USAging (the national association of area agencies on aging) at the Gerontological Society of America annual scientific meeting in Seattle in November 2024, leading her to request a consultation for inclusion of questions related to disaster preparedness among area agencies on aging in their national survey that will be conducted next year.
- Sarah Hayford, who studies childbearing intentions and behaviors, presented to the U.S. Treasury Social Security Trustees Working Group on August 19, 2024. The presentation (with Dr. Karen Benjamin Guzzo of the Carolina Population Center), discussed challenges in measuring childbearing intentions and how intentions may change over the life course. Current Social Security projections of birth rates assume that most people will carry out their intentions to have children; Hayford and Guzzo's research suggests that these projections may overestimate birth rates and, therefore, overestimate future population growth and the stability of Social Security.
- Sarah Schoppe-Sullivan, an expert on fathering and children's outcomes, presented to the Surgeon General of the United States, Dr. Vivek Murthy, at an online event on January 19, 2024. The event was organized by the American Institute for Boys and Men. Working with Dr. Jay Fagan (emeritus, Temple University), Dr. Schoppe-Sullivan discussed trends in father involvement; impacts of involved fathering on children, mothers, and fathers; interventions targeting fathers; and policy barriers and recommendations for overcoming barriers. On Dr. Murthy's request, Dr. Schoppe-Sullivan and her colleagues also prepared a follow-up report with written recommendations.
- In June 2024, the Tanzanian Ministry of Health released a report endorsing a new algorithmic approach for establishing cause of death in community settings developed by a team led by Sam Clark. The algorithmic approach, InSilicoVA, uses automated computer coded procedures to analyze data from verbal autopsies to determine cause of death, providing faster and more cost-effective results compared to relying on physicians to code data. In settings where death certificates and medical records are not widely available, this method provides broader and more accurate information on the distribution of causes of death, which is vital for planning interventions to improve health.

Research to Policy

- On July 8, 2024, Norma B. Coe provided an analysis in response to a request for information from U.S. Senator Elizabeth Warren on the impact of repealing the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services minimum staffing rule on patient outcomes. The analysis projects that enforcing CMS' new rule on minimum staffing levels would save approximately 13,000 lives per year and reduce several adverse outcomes for residents.
- Lance Freeman's research was cited by The Public Interest Law Center in their testimony to Philadelphia's Committee on Housing, Neighborhood Development, and the Homeless in support of Bill 240060 on May 29, 2024, to tackle income discrimination in Philadelphia.
- Atheendar Venkataramani is cited in an AFL-CIO letter from September 11, 2024, to The
 Honorable Bernie Sanders, Chair, and The Honorable Bill Cassidy, Ranking Member, of
 the U.S. Senate Committee on Health, Education, Labor and Pensions, on how health care
 consolidation and the growing role of private equity has hurt working families.
- Dennis Culhane provided testimony on a case in the U.S. District Court, Central District of California, in 2024 concerning the homelessness crisis in Los Angeles, the quality of the HUD-VASH programs, and the ineffectiveness in addressing or resolving that crisis. He also testified that the veteran homelessness crisis in Los Angeles has not been abated by either the Veteran Administration's or the County/City of Los Angeles' initiatives and that the HUD-VASH program is not working to resolve the veteran homelessness crisis either, both based upon the number of exits compared to entries into the program and because of the inadequacy of the case management function provided by the VA. He based this testimony on facts presented to him through public records and information made available by the VA itself, as well as through his experience working for the VA.

 Landscaping Best Practices and Policy Tools for Successful Socioeconomic Integration of Refugees and Migrants—Dany Bahar completed research in September 2024 examining interventions—ranging from legal status adjustments and language training to active labor market policies, cash transfers, and strategies for initial placement and community

Research to Policy (cont'd)

engagement—for successful integration of refugees and migrants. The study further explored several new policy avenues that have the potential to make the returns to initial-placement policies and networks scalable—namely, the effective use of private sponsors, refugee-led organizations, administrators, and matching technologies.

- State Policy, Rural Residence, and Alzheimer's Disease and Alzheimer's Disease-Related Dementias—Rural Americans have had poorer health profiles than their urban peers since at least the 1980s, and this gap has widened over time. Meghan Zacher is currently conducting a two-year project that will examine where and for whom rural residence is associated with Alzheimer's disease and Alzheimer's disease-related dementias.
- Personalizing Math Instruction at Scale: A Meta-Analytic and Cost-Effectiveness Analysis of Math Tutoring Programs—Researchers estimate that median student achievement fell 0.24 standard deviations in math in the United States, with even larger declines among low-achieving students (Callen et al. 2024). The pandemic both exacerbated longstanding inequalities in student achievement and created a shared priority to accelerate student learning—Matthew Kraft and Beth Schueler are currently studying whether peer tutoring may offer a cost-effective model for scaling.
- Implications of Algorithmic Decision-making for Racial Inequality in Long-Term Care—Ailish Burns and Emily Rauscher are conducting research that will shed light on how algorithmic decision-making, and which characteristics of algorithms, are better or worse for equity in access to long-term care. Many states now use algorithms to make determinations on Medicaid eligibility for elderly people and people with disabilities; although algorithms are often purported to be less biased than humans, research has shown that algorithms often increase inequality, especially between demographic categories. The number of people who require long-term care will likely increase as the elderly population grows over the next few decades, making this issue particularly timely.
- Misconduct and Recidivism Effects of the IGNITE Program—Peter Hull and colleagues
 published results in 2024 showing that exposure to IGNITE (Inmate Growth Naturally and
 Intentionally Through Education) in Flint, Michigan dramatically reduces an individual's
 propensity for both within-jail misconduct and post-release recidivism. A longstanding
 and influential view in U.S. correctional policy is that "nothing works" when it comes to
 rehabilitating incarcerated individuals—these findings show that is not the case and that
 the IGNITE program works.

Research to Policy

- State agencies and government entities fund many of the Institute's research projects, and our research guides government planning, funding allocations, data collection, and reporting practices. The Texas Demographic Center Estimates and Projections have a statewide impact and can directly influence the state legislature's passage. For example, the 88th Texas Legislature (2023–2024) passed Senate Bill 728, which established the Statewide Interagency Aging Services Coordinating Council. The bill cited the projections produced by the Center on the population of Texans who are 65 years or older.
- IDSER research staff often testify as area experts before legislative committees on demographic and socioeconomic trends in Texas. A recent example is the testimony on demographic trends in Texas presented by Lloyd Potter in Austin before the Texas House Committee on Appropriations in September 2024 to communicate demographic trends and projections of population change and distribution along with identifying key legislative priorities that are impacted by population change that include issues related to water, electricity, transportation, education, and housing.

Research to Policy

- In a 2024 study of the White population living in Nashville, Tennessee, Patricia Louie found that anti-Black racism harms respondent's health. Perceived neighborhood danger predicts increased symptoms of psychophysiological distress. However, low-SES Whites also report perceptions of higher status when living near more Black neighbors, which entirely offsets their distress. They conclude that although anti-Black racism can ironically harm the health of White Americans, compensatory racist ideologies can also offset these harms, particularly for lower-status Whites. They situate their findings within broader discussions of anti-Black racism, residential segregation, and psychiatric disorders commonly observed among White Americans.
- Avanti Adhia, Ali Rowhani-Rahbar, Alice Ellyson, and colleagues released a 2024 study that assessed differences in respondent firearm access and the use of weapons in granted domestic violence protection orders (DVPOs) with and without minors (individuals <18 years of age), finding higher lethality risk (weapon use and respondent firearm access/ownership) among DVPOs including minors. Many minors experienced threats and acts of violence involving weapons and firearms by DVPO respondents. Evidence-based safety planning strategies and training of judicial officers are needed. This research was distributed to pediatricians, via the American Pediatric Association and its flagship journal *Pediatrics*.
- Using sixteen years of evidence from the Health and Retirement Study and deploying new algorithms to classify dimension, Stipicia Mudrazaji and colleagues found in their 2024 study that older adults classified with dementia were more likely to drop out of the labor force and become poor than similar older adults without dementia, highlighting the economic costs of dementia and emphasizing the need for early interventions to reduce financial strain across diverse older adults.
- In a balanced sample of California schools with observations covering 5 years, Melissa Knox, Jessica Jones-Smith, Anirban Basu, and Tom Lindman conducted a 2024 study that found that participation in universal school lunch programs is associated with a modest net decrease in obesity prevalence compared with eligible, nonparticipating schools, adding evidence to the benefits of universal free school meals for children's well-being. The research was shared with the American Academy of Pediatricians and published in *Pediatrics*.
- In a 2024 published study, Alison Fohner and colleagues examined electronic health records to evaluate community-level health effects of a community-based participatory research program (CBPR) in Alaska, finding that CBPR engagement significantly improved health outcomes. By prioritising community respect, trust, and benefit in longterm research collaboration, CBPR is the ethical standard for engaging communities worldwide. This is the first study of its kind to demonstrate the sustained impact of CBPR on improving overall and condition-specific community health.
- Jenna Van Draanen, Emily Williams, Heather Hill, Ali Rowhani-Rahbar, and colleagues conducted a 2024 study that found no significant impact of the earned income tax credit (EITC)—which issues supplemental income for workers with children in the United States—on rates of substance use disorders and fatal overdose at the state level.
- In a 2024 longitudinal cohort study, Jessica Jones-Smith, Melissa Knox, and Jessica Godwin found that the Seattle sweetened beverage tax was associated with a modest decrease in BMIp95 among children living in Seattle compared with children living in nearby nontaxed areas who were receiving care within the same health care systems. Taken together with existing studies in the United States, these results suggest that sweetened beverage taxes may be an effective policy for improving children's BMI.

Research to Policy

- Mark Mather moderated a Congressional briefing on "Maternal Mortality in America," on Capitol Hill in July 2024. This event, which was hosted by the Population Association of America and co-sponsored by PRB, featured a panel of experts who discussed racial disparities in maternal deaths and potential interventions to solve this problem.
- In June 2024, Beth Jarosz of PRB hosted a virtual Book Talk focused on "Holding It Together: How Women Became America's Safety Net," with author and sociologist Jessica Calarco. A panel of NICHD-funded researchers discussed Calarco's key findings and their implications for reproductive health care policy and explored additional research on abortion, contraception, fertility, gender, and motherhood.
- Beth Jarosz organized a webinar in June 2024 on "Data Opportunities and Challenges in a Post-Roe World." This public event featured NICHD-funded expert panelists who discussed questions including: What are the barriers to conducting abortion-related research today? What have we learned from the data so far? And where are the data gaps and how can we fill them?
- PRB has also continued to translate and disseminate major peer-reviewed findings, methods, and perspectives from population dynamics research to other scientists to nontechnical audiences including policymakers, program directors, practitioners, educators, journalists, and students. Research to Policy

- Recent work of Leigh Senderowicz provides a contraceptive autonomy framework proposing challenges to the status quo that has influenced technical advisory groups such as the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation (2023 and 2024); their group discussed Senderowicz's work and informed her that it has impacted their thinking about these issues.
- Jenny Higgin's research with colleagues at the Collaborative for Reproductive Equity (CORE) has been used by litigators, policymakers, advocates, journalists, and health care providers in Wisconsin to inform legislation and programs that support abortion care, contraceptive care, and other aspects of reproductive autonomy, including the Reproductive Freedom Act. For example, litigants in two cases before the Wisconsin Supreme Court have used Higgins' research and evidence summaries in their briefs to the court (August 2024—present): Kaul v. Urmanski seeks to determine whether an 1849 state law criminalizes providing abortion care; and Planned Parenthood v. Wisconsin seeks to determine whether abortion access is protected by the state constitution.
- Alejandra Ros Pilarz's research on parental employment, early care and education
 (ECE), and child well-being has been used by local, state, and national organizations to
 advocate for enhanced labor regulations and ECE system reforms. Her 2024 article, The
 Effects of State Workplace Pregnancy Accommodation Laws on Women's Employment
 and Income During Pregnancy, examines the effects of public policies on parental
 employment, children's early care and education participation, and child and family wellbeing, helping to identify which policies are working well to improve child and family wellbeing as well as the need for new policies or policy changes that would better support
 children and families. Dr. Pilarz's research informed A Better Balance's 2024 report
 detailing the progress of the Pregnant Workers Fairness Act requiring covered employers
 to provide reasonable accommodations related to pregnancy and childbirth.
- Katherine Curtis was appointed in fall 2024 as co-author on the Sixth National Climate
 Assessment (NCA6), the U.S. Government's premier and congressionally mandated
 report on climate change impacts, risks, and adaptation across the nation. The NCA6
 is the first of the National Climate Assessments to feature social systems as a guiding
 chapter that will frame the entire assessment. Curtis is bringing her expertise on social
 demography to contribute and inform the guiding chapter on Social Systems as well as
 the overall assessment.

Research to Policy

- Christine Schwartz's research on family demography and its impacts on the labor force
 was cited in chapter 3 "Population, Aging, and the Economy," of the 2024 Economic
 Report of the President, published on March 21, 2024, and shared with members of
 Congress. Schwartz and team were cited with reference to declining fertility in the United
 States in this chapter, which focuses on the question of whether widespread, long-run
 declines in U.S. birthrates—and birthrates worldwide—are rooted in improvements in
 living standards, wages, and opportunities.
- Kristin Litzelman worked with the Wisconsin Family and Caregiver Support Alliance (WFACSA) to develop a comprehensive toolkit with resources and materials to build awareness and engagement around caregiver support leading up to National Caregiver Month in November 2024. Outreach efforts involved Wisconsin's 72 counties and 11 federally recognized tribes. Additionally, Litzelman provided leadership and is working collaboratively to provide input and support for WFACSA's 2024 project, funded by the Administration on Aging, to advance support for caregivers in Wisconsin. Raising awareness and building engagement with support services across all levels is crucially important for ensuring that caregivers get the support they need to continue providing high quality care and to flourish.
- Megan Zuelsdorff chaired a National Institute on Aging/National Alzheimer's Coordinating
 Center workgroup tasked with developing a social determinants of health module for
 the uniform data set collected across all 37 Aging and Disability Resource Centers
 nationwide. The form was finalized in Fall of 2024 and will provide a crucial jumpingoff point for researchers and teams who are interested in contextualizing dementia
 prevention, intervention effectiveness, diagnosis, and care. The new module will be
 mandatory for at least one visit for all ADRC participants moving forward, with data
 submitted to and aggregated by the National Alzheimer's Coordinating Center.
